MONDAY, JUNE 15

9:00-9:25 a.m. – Welcome and Orientation

9:30 a.m.-12:00 p.m. – Academic Language Classes (4 levels)

1:30-3:00 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Ballet Folklórico – Learn the history and meaning behind several regional Mexican dances from Instructor Elizabeth Ornelas and her troupe of young dancers. They will perform several dances – including *el canelo* (Veracruz), *el gusto* (Jalisco) and *danza del fuego* (Mexico City). You will learn the basic steps to at least one traditional dance so that you can dance along with them! (Recommended for all language levels.)
2. Latin American Indigenous Cultures – Explore the fascinating ancient civilizations of Latin America, including the *huichol* and *zapoteca* of Mexico, the *quiché* and *kaqchikel* Maya of Guatemala, and the *kuna* tribe of Panama. Instructor Jude Hawkes will introduce indigenous *artesanía*, music, and folklore to deepen your understanding of the rich cultural history of Latin America. (Recommended for all language levels.)
3. Tour of Cuba – This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Cuban Revolution. Embargoed by the United States for decades, clinging to communism, and plagued by low living standards, this Caribbean nation proves that the human spirit endures through it all. Instructor Raquel Arenz will describe contemporary Cuba through the lens of a local family in La Havana. (Recommended for students in language levels 3 and 4.)

3:15-4:15 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Grammar Clinic – Focus on the uses of *ser* and *estar*. Instructor Lori Burks will present grammar tips on these two critical verb forms then lead the group in conversational practice.
2. Latin Dance – Get moving to the infectious rhythms of dance music! Instructor Hazel Tenorio will teach basic *salsa* dance steps.

TUESDAY, JUNE 16

9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. – Academic Language Classes (4 levels)

1:30-3:00 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Mexican Folk Songs – Explore the Mexican musical traditions of *mariachi* and *ranchera*. Singer and guitarist Damian Rodriguez will discuss these traditions while performing several songs. He will also invite the group to learn a few *ranchera* songs and sing along. (Recommended for all language levels.)
2. Women Artists in Latin America – Discover the contributions of key Latin American women artists in the first half of the 20th century. Instructor Courtney Gilbert will focus on Maria Izquierdo and Frida Kahlo (surrealism in Mexico), Mira Schendel and Gego (Constructivism in Brazil and Venezuela), and Lygia Clark and Lygia Pape (concrete and neo-concrete art in Brazil), among other artists. (Recommended for all language levels.)

3:15-4:15 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Grammar Clinic – Focus on the differences between *por* and *para*. Instructor Lori Burks will present grammar tips then lead the group in conversational practice.
2. Yoga – Relax and stretch while learning Spanish vocabulary for the body and movement. Instructor Victoria Roper will teach this basic yoga class.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 17

9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. – Academic language classes (4 levels)

12:15-1:15 – *Almuerzo Intercambio* – Enjoy conversational practice with native Spanish speakers over a catered lunch.

1:30-3:00 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Cooking Paella – Learn the history of *paella*, a quintessential Spanish dish, and how to prepare it. Instructor Pilar Lindahl will share her cooking secrets. (And you get to taste the delicious results!) (Recommended for all language levels.)
2. Journey through South America – Get a comprehensive view of the people, geography, and cultures of South America from Instructor Raquel Arenz, who recently traveled across the entire continent during a semester sabbatical. (Recommended for students in language levels 3 and 4.)
3. Latin American Short Story – Read the short story “La autopista del sur” by Argentinian writer Julio Cortázar. The story focuses on a traffic jam, and it will prompt discussion of diversity and solidarity. Instructor Hazel Tenorio will teach literary terminology and provide context about Latin American literature. Pick up the short story at the CSI office at the beginning of the week. (Recommended for students in language levels 3 and 4.)

3:15-4:15 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Grammar Clinic – Focus on the many Spanish verbs for the English expression “to get.” Instructor Lori Burks will present grammar tips then lead the group in conversational practice.
2. Latin Dance – Get moving to the infectious rhythms of Latin and Caribbean dance music! Instructor Hazel Tenorio will teach basic *salsa* dance steps.

5:30-7:30 p.m. – “La historia oficial” Film Screening – Set in Argentina near the end of the right-wing military government’s campaign of terror known as the Dirty War, involving the forced disappearance of 30,000 people from 1976 to 1983. The film won Golden Globe and Oscar awards for the best foreign film of 1986. Instructor Jude Hawkes will facilitate vocabulary and historical and cultural understanding in group discussion before and after the film. The film will be shown in Spanish with English subtitles. It is rated R. Bring a friend!

THURSDAY, JUNE 18

9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. – Academic language classes (4 levels)

1:30-3:00 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Tamales and More: Cooking Guatemalan Style – Learn surprising and delicious variations in typical Latin American food dishes from Instructor Millie Gaitan-Gonzalez. Millie will demonstrate how to prepare traditional foods from her native Guatemala. (Recommended for all language levels.)
2. Historical Tour of Spain – Explore the rich social, political, and cultural history of Spain, including the famed Spanish explorers, in a multimedia presentation by Instructor Pilar Lindahl. (Recommended for all language levels.)

3:15-4:15 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Grammar Clinic – Focus on giving and following street directions. Instructor Lori Burks will present grammar tips then send the group on a scavenger hunt to practice.
2. Yoga – Relax and stretch while learning Spanish vocabulary for the body and movement. Instructor Victoria Roper will teach this basic yoga class.

FRIDAY, JUNE 19

9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. – Academic language classes (4 levels)

1:30-3:00 p.m. – Workshops (choose one)

1. Latin American Poetry – Read and discuss poetry of land, love, and destiny. Instructor Jude Hawkes will introduce two genres of Latin American poetry written from the end of the 19th century and through the 20th century, focusing on José Martí of Cuba, José Santos Chocano of Peru, Pablo Neruda of Chile, and Octavio Paz of Mexico. Pick up a packet of readings (4 poems) at the beginning of the week from the CSI office. (Recommended for students in language levels 3 and 4.)
2. The Andes Meet the Caribbean and Move to the Rockies – Learn about two different Latin American countries and the joys and challenges of cross-cultural engagement. Rosa Dávila (also a CSI chemistry professor) is from Puerto Rico; her husband, Gerardo

Muñoz, is from Colombia, and they are raising their family in Idaho. They will introduce the music, food, and history of their different cultural traditions. (Recommended for all language levels.)

3:15-4:15 p.m. – Graduation! Closing remarks by Judge Sergio Gutierrez. Judge Gutierrez sits on the Idaho Court of Appeals.

7:00 p.m.-9:00 p.m. – ¡FANDANGO! Celebrate the week of Spanish immersion at an outdoor community concert with **ALEX CUBA**. Cuba hails from Cuba and now lives in Canada; he sings in Spanish, and his cross-cultural sound reflects his geographical journey.
